

SAMARITANS-PURSE SHOEBOXES — Ashbury is once again supporting the Operation Christmas Child shoebox appeal organised by Samaritan's Purse. Since the beginning of the war in Ukraine thousands of boxes have already been distributed at stations where evacuation trains stopped, in churches where families were evacuated overnight, in hospital and shelters. Anyone can pack a shoebox - individuals, families, churches and groups fill empty shoeboxes with school supplies, hygiene items and fun toys, such as dolls or soccer balls. If you want to join us you can either

pack a shoebox and leave it in the church, "How to Pack a Shoebox" leaflets are available in the church porch now or from Maggie Simons, and there are also a few empty shoeboxes just inside the church if you need one. Alternatively you can pack a shoebox online, go to www.shoeboxonline.org.uk. We will then deliver them to Highworth which is our drop off centre on Monday 21st November.

Thought piece

"I'm writing this on Thursday 20 October (late again, sorry Marion!) and it seems important to mention this as who knows how the world will look by the time you read it. Between political crises at home and war in Ukraine, it is hard to pull oneself away from the tv news, even if I am at times watching it from behind a cushion – rather the way I used to watch Dr Who as a child. Many of us are at a loss for words – and perhaps more of us should be, as much of the ongoing commentary is as unhelpful as it is unkind."

Well, that was as far as I'd got before the news broke that Liz Truss had resigned. If it is possible to complete the process in the timescale they're talking about, we will probably have a new prime minister by the time you read this. Right now, it seems clear that the conservative party knows who it doesn't want – it seems less clear about who it does. Not that it will be anything to do with me, I venture to make a suggestion ...

In our church schools, children learn about Christian values – things like truthfulness, compassion, generosity and dignity. They learn these primarily from their teachers, but Richard and I go in once a week to draw more explicit comparisons with scripture. This term, we have been thinking about wisdom and we asked today what they thought wisdom was all about. Their answers shouldn't surprise us – making good choices; learning from others; being kind; learning from mistakes. In one sense these things are obvious yet, somehow, once people leave school, they seem to become less so even though, I suspect, few people deliberately set out to be unwise. The new leader of the conservative party does not have to be a Christian, but I believe it would help if he or she could commit to living out those basic human values.

I am saddened by the way the world seems to be going. On a personal level, I am even sorry for Liz Truss, but I never thought that being a vicar in the Vale of White Horse would involve discussions about food banks, the provision of warm spaces and child mental health. However, I am encouraged by the people I meet who are trying to do something about the problems. And I am energised every time I go into our

schools, because our children are amazing. Thoughtful, caring, funny and determined to make the world a better place. Our job, as I said in a sermon last week, is to do our best to look after it until they are in a position to make wise decisions. And I am uplifted by the knowledge that, despite what we think, God is ultimately in charge and will help us find a way forward.

From the archives..... traffic accidents...Nov 1911 and Ashbury's first Parish council election. Swindon Advertiser & N. Wilts Chronicle 18 November 1894

TRACTION ENGINE IN THE CANAL - Much excitement was caused in the village on Wednesday afternoon when it was known that a traction engine had crashed through the wooden drawbridge that spans the Berks and Wilts Canal, where it crosses the Ashbury Road. The engine, which belongs to Sir F. W. Carden, of Star Grove, East Woodhave, was conveying a load of fodder in two trucks from the Home Farm to the Barrington Arms Hotel, Shrivenham, where the owner's horses are being stabled for the hunting season. Proceeding up the Ashbury Road the driver attempted to cross the bridge. The two front wheels landed safely on the other side, but the hinder part of the engine was precipitated into the water. Fortunately the men in charge of the vehicles sustained no injury, but considerable inconvenience is caused by the road being completely blocked to vehicular traffic. The work of extricating the engine by means of a steam crane is in pro ress.

It was proposed and agreed to by those present, that the six persons nominated having the highest number of votes he elected as Parish Councillors. No pole demanded. The Rev. Charles I. F. Yule was present. The Chairman for the evening only was Mr. John Henry Lawrence, proposed by Mr. T. C. Carter, and seconded by Mr. Henry Tucker. Country Matters

Writing this the weather is still kind, autumn planting is almost relaxed and cattle are still out and we again have some grass after the dry summer. Folk will be pleased not to start their heating up! My focus in retirement turns to sport and man's best friend our dogs, our hounds. Of Winston Churchill's many quotes he famously observed "that a cat can look down on you, a pig will look you right in the eye and dogs look up at you." Their eyes are constantly on their master, waiting one's next move. One of my favourite farming authors was AG Street who died in the 1960's. He wrote Farmer's Glory and had a dog called "Shadow", a good name.

The recent news story of a dog at Bristol caught on camera finding its way back home across the city on a journey of five miles illustrates their uncanny senses with extraordinary sat nav instincts to chart a way home. St Mary's Ashbury has a fine banner dedicated to St Hubert, the patron saint of hunting. The banner was woven by the sisters of St Mary the Virgin's convent at Wantage in the late nineteenth century to grace Evelyn, Countess Craven's chapel at Ashdown Park, a historic hunting lodge.

Following her death in 1924 these and other artefacts were donated to Ashbury church 1926. St Swithin's church, Compton Beauchamp sometimes has a service celebrating the life of St Hubert. I remember Rodney Elton once preaching there when he compared the life of a hound as it searches for scent, with the life of a Christian, also searching for the true path to find glory in pursuit of Jesus Christ's Christian teaching. He colourfully described a sporting dog/ hound's olfactory organs sifting and processing the information just as precisely as a computer. The Intelligence gained would immediately decipher the specific species followed, the freshness, the trail, and the stress factor of the quarry.

One problem can arise when a dog/hound hits the line of scent and struggles to discern its direction. Erroneously following a scent backwards is said to be a "heel scent". The Old Berks Hunt usually have their Opening Meet on the first Saturday in November at 11am on Baulking Green and all are welcome.

I would not be without my cocker called Flo on my shooting expeditions. Her acute senses for smell and hearing are so much better than humankind. Some dogs can even anticipate a visitor arriving with uncanny prescience. Lurchers and whippets are sight animals and love to gain high ground to survey the scene. Spaniels are brilliant at finding and retrieving wounded birds in deep undergrowth. We would be lost without them and my suppers will feature pheasant and partridge once more this winter.
