

#### A New Full Council; A New Flagpole and A Revised Neighbourhood Plan Your Help Needed

At our first meeting after the summer break, we co-opted Eliza Lewis to take the sixth available place on the Parish Council. So we are now a full team. Our lead responsibilities will be:

We are here to serve the whole community as best we can over the next four years. There are two initiatives which I wish to highlight and for which we need your help.

First, the time has come to review and update our Neighbourhood Plan, which you voted for so enthusiastically in 2019. Major developments in planning and development are underway at local and national government level which we need to try to influence. Those emerging new policies will have to be reflected in our own NP, if it is to be at all effective in promoting what we want for our community. Climate Change / Sustainability and Transport and Digital Connectivity are at the heart of this new agenda.

To lead this review, we have set up a new Steering Group and I invite everyone with an interest, please, to come forward and share your thoughts and expertise. The first task of the group will be to consult all residents about what is going to be most important to us as a community over the next 25 years.

**Please consider coming forward to contribute to this effort.** No particular experience or professional background is needed. Awareness of our community's needs and the will to help is enough.

The Group will be meeting next at **1900 on Wednesday 18 Octobe**r in the Rose and Crown. Please come along. You will not be committing yourself to any long-term role.

Second, we need everyone's help to restore a flagpole to the top of the church tower. After last year's Platinum Jubilee, there were calls for the parish to have a flag to fly and much debate followed on where it might be put and how to pay for it. Last week the Council decided that the best place for a flagpole, if the funds for it can be found, will be back on top of the church tower, where flags have been flown in centuries past and from where a flag can still be seen from many approaches to Ashbury. The Church Wardens have agreed to the project, a volunteer has offered to manage the flying of a flag from the tower for the first two years and we are confident planning consent for a listed building can be obtained. We now only need to raise the funds. At this stage we believe we need an additional £2,000, to add to the £1,000 grant already in hand from OCC.

We hope that this is a project which will appeal to all in the parish. The best result would be to raise the £2,000 through hundreds of smaller donations. That would show true breadth of support and engagement across the community. We are launching this appeal now and urge you, please, to give whatever you can afford to "Fly the Flag for Ashbury".

There will be collecting boxes in the Rose and Crown and the Ashbury Village Shop; and we are planning other initiatives to help to reach our goal. Perhaps a sponsored walk; or a craft project with wood from a churchyard elm, which is having to be cut down. Every little will help. If you have an idea for raising funds for "Fly the Flag for Ashbury", do please let us know.

# DO YOU WANT A 20MPH TRAFFIC ZONE THROUGHOUT ASHBURY, K.W AND IDSTONE? WE NEED YOUR VIEWS AND SUPPORT- PLEASE READ THE FOLLOWING AND STUDY THE MAP TO SEE THE PROPOSALS:

### OXFORDSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL (ASHBURY PARISH) (20 MPH SPEED LIMITS) ORDER 20\*\*

NOTICE is given that Oxfordshire County Council proposes to make the above order under the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 and all other enabling powers. The effect of the order - in support of road safety issues - is to introduce a **20mph speed limit** throughout Ashbury replacing the existing 30mph speed limit in the process, leading out of the village to the following points:

- B4000 Station Road (northern end) a point 40 metres northwest of its junction with Pound Piece,
- 2. <u>B4000 Ashbury Hill</u> (southern end) a point 175 metres south of its junction with the B4507 / High Street,
- 3. <u>B4507 Walnut Trees Hill</u> a point 120 metres northeast of its junction with Wixes Piece,
- 4. Idstone Road a point 300 metres southwest of College Farm Lane.

Also included are the following specific lengths of road:

- 5. Kingstone Winslow for its entire length,
- 6. the unnamed road leading southwards from Kingstone Winslow to Kingstone Upper Mill for its entire length,
- Station Road from its junction with Kingstone Winslow, south-westwards to its junction with the B4000.


Additionally, a **20mph speed limit** will be introduced within the hamlet of ldstone, extending out to the following points:

- the unnamed road leading south-westwards to Bishopstone (southern end) a point 35 metres southwest of its junction with the access to 'Rectory Farm',
- the unnamed road leading south-westwards to Bishopstone (northern end) its junction with the unnamed road leading to Lower Idstone Farm,
- the unnamed road leading to Lower Idstone Farm its junction with the unnamed road leading south-westwards to Bishopstone.

## OXFORDSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL (ASHBURY PARISH) (20 MPH SPEED LIMITS) ORDER 20\*\*

#### STATEMENT OF REASONS

Oxfordshire County Council wants to make our built environments safer and more attractive places to walk and cycle. To enable this, 20mph speed restrictions are being used to help promote alternative modes of transport for local travel.

Streets are central to everyday life in Oxfordshire. They play a role in all transport journey's and are places where people shop, work and spend time. Improving the experience of being on Oxfordshire's streets will therefore improve people's local areas and their everyday lives. Improving streets to encourage active travel will also help to deliver further benefits for people in Oxfordshire. A wide range of people choosing to walk, and cycle will help to improve public health, reduce road noise, improve air quality and make local areas more relaxing. Furthermore, 20mph speed limits will help reduce casualty rates and improve road safety.

Following concerns raised by the parish regarding road safety on local roads, Oxfordshire County Council is proposing to introduce a 20mph speed limit throughout Ashbury, replacing the existing 30mph speed limit in the process. Additionally, a 20mph speed limit will also be introduced on the roads within the adjacent hamlet of ldstone.

The County Council continues its responsibility to consider the provision of convenient and safe movement of motor vehicles and other traffic, and the proposed measures are aimed at ensuring that danger is minimised whilst facilitating the effective and safe passage of traffic.

## OXFORDSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL (ASHBURY PARISH) (20 MPH SPEED LIMIT) ORDER 20\*\*

The Oxfordshire County Council, in exercise of their powers under sections 82, 83 & 84 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984, and of all other enabling powers, after consultation with the chief officer of police in accordance with Part III of Schedule 9 to that Act, hereby make the following Order.

- This Order may be cited as the Oxfordshire County Council (Ashbury Parish Parish) (20mph Speed Limit) Order 202\* and shall come into force on the day of 202\*.
- The roads specified in the Schedule to this Order shall not be restricted roads for the purposes of section 81 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984.
- No person shall drive any motor vehicle at a speed exceeding 20 miles per hour in the lengths of road specified in Schedule 1 to this Order.
- 4. No speed limit imposed by this Order applies to a vehicle falling within Regulation 3(4) of the Road Traffic Exemptions (Special Forces) (Variation and Amendment) Regulations 2011, being a vehicle used for naval, military or air force purposes, when used in accordance with regulation 3(5) of those regulations.

You may have seen in the newspapers that Rodney Elton died on 19 August 2023 aged 93. I received the news of my appointed to join the Shrivenham and Ashbury benefice with so much joy and happiness. I felt I have been given an opportunity to share my spiritual journey with the

Don't forget – we don't meet in the Chapel any more but round the corner in St.Mary's. If you fancy a cuppa, a natter and a laugh do come and join us - everyone is welcome and there's no charge, although donations to our chosen charity are always welcome.

**The Ambassadors Bible Church** meet at what was the Ashbury Evangelical Free Church at 10:00 am each Sunday morning. All are welcome and there is also a Sunday School for the Children which meets at the same time.

#### **Country Matters**

The first harvest I can recall was 1958. Writers like to fantasise, remembering the benign summers of times past. Well, this one was stormy and difficult. As small farmers (250 acres) with 40 Shorthorn milking cows and followers, my father also grew 80 acres of corn plus about 10 acres of potatoes and 10 acres of sugar beet. For us, this was the last year with the binder before he bought a small combine and I remember the sheaves in stooks, placed to dry but incessant rain prevented carting and the wheat was growing out, so the tops of the sheaves were green.

JM Stratton's agricultural records give wheat yields that year of 1.25 t/acre (3t/hectare) sold at £20/t. Now we expect 4t/a (10t/h) and prices have come down from last year's highs over £300/t to around £200. The Ukrainian war and oil supplies remain volatile drivers for prices in agriculture and food generally.

This year's harvest was stop go to get it in the barn and generally across the country we have finished up with disappointing yields. Like the curate's egg it has been a harvest of two halves. Early sown autumn planted wheat and barley yielded OK but later planted wheat, spring barley, oats and beans have been poor. The three things farmers cannot control are the weather, the world prices and the politicians. I do not grumble, but the weather is always breaking records good and bad. Floods in Libya, earthquakes in Morocco, terrible fires in Canada and Greece, we must be thankful we can get our harvest.

Looking at weather effects this last year, later planted autumn crops suffered plant loss from very early hard frosts in mid -December. The spring was cold, wet and extended then dry in May followed by a lovely June. July was wet and August poor and showery. With regard to the politicians, Theresa Coffey, the environmental minister seems to be listening. Progress is unreliable on vaccinating badgers against TB so the cull continues to mitigate cattle slaughtering and she has endorsed the continued use of Roundup, essential for non-organic regenerative farming.

It's never an ill wind. The wet summer has been good for the bird cover we plant for game shooting, and examining our hedgerows, they have put on a lot of growth. I don't think it's my imagination but the hawthorn berries or haws seem to me to be a deep red and unusually profuse this year. But, blackberries are there in numbers but they are small and not very sweet which may be a clue to the disappointing harvest especially for crops other than those sown in September/early October last year.
